Waiting Times

We prioritise patients with diabetes according to NICE guidance. Patients with acute problems/ulceration will be seen within 24 working hours of receipt of referral. We encourage HCPs to access the service for any patients with ulceration.

We prioritise non-urgent patients according to the information given in the referral letter and give appointments in their local clinic. Waiting times vary at different clinics according to need.

Hospital Patient Criteria

Patients with current foot ulceration.

Patients with suspected or diagnosed active Charcot joints.

Patients with lower limb amputation/surgical wounds.

Very high risk patients where ulceration is deemed highly likely, with or without diabetes.

Patients with significant symptoms of vascular disease.

Community Patient Criteria

Patients with diabetes at low to moderate risk of ulceration.

Patients with callous or corns and no other risk factors.

Patients with biomechanical problems.

Patients at low risk of developing ulceration.

Patients with pathological nail care needs.

Acute foot problem clinics are run at Scarborough Hospital on Wednesday morning alongside vascular and diabetes consultant clinics in the hospital. This gives the advantage of access to medical opinion for complex cases. Ryedale patients may be offered appointments at York Hospital

- All foot lesions are treated if occurring on or below the medial and lateral malleoli. (Leg ulcers are not routinely treated by the podiatrist.)
- Debridement of callous, slough, necrotic tissue and bone - including sharp or chemical debridement and use of larvae.
- Wound cleansing and taking of tissue or bone samples for culture.
- Wound measurement and recording by digital photography.
- · Dressing selection and care planning.
- Chair-side orthotics and slipper casts for pressure relief.
- Antibiotic provision according to protocol (with agreement of physician).
- Supply of trauma shoes, Air Cast walkers, offloading footwear, correctional and functional silicone devices.
- TNP (topical negative pressure dressings) for large ulceration or post-surgical wounds in conjunction with TVN.
- Ongoing education of patients and staff on assessment, treatment and consequences of diabetic foot disease.

Ward visits are prioritised according to need. Patients admitted with diabetic and/or vascular foot ulcers or amputation are given highest priority. As in community, nail care is regarded as a hygiene task not a medical need. Ward referrals are accepted from any clinical hospital staff
